





In February, <u>City of Tents:</u> Veterans Row took listeners through the history and impact of the Veterans Row encampment in Los Angeles' Brentwood neighborhood. The series investigated the Veterans Administration and their plans for assisting unhoused veterans. The eight-episode series is the culmination of more than two years of research and relationship building to uncover the complex perspectives, policies and bureaucracies surrounding a community of veterans. 

Food Coverage



As an international food city, Los Angeles can be hard to navigate. KCRW's *Good Food* team with host Evan Kleiman break down the complexities — from social trends, and food politics to the science behind cooking — to highlight the diverse cooks, farmers, entrepreneurs, historians, and journalists who have devoted their lives to food.

And what's food without its community of eaters? In 2023, we expanded the communal table by inviting more people in and also meeting you where you are:

- Added more social videos featuring recipes, gardening, taste-tests, and demos
- Expanded capacity at food-related events such as PieFest at UCLA in partnership with the Fowler Museum, and KCRW and Gustavo's Great Tortilla Tournament in partnership with and at Smorgasburg
- Promoted Good Food the podcast to serve younger, more diverse listeners.
- Grew the Good Food newsletter, written by Evan Kleiman, to include more recipes, favorite books, restaurants, interviews, and Evan's favorite recommended links

Entertainment Coverage



As this year's Hollywood strikes took hold, KCRW focused on entertainment's biggest story from two distinct angles. It was a local business story that would affect caterers and florists in our communities as much as it would impact the actors and writers who were picketing, and even when the strikes ended there was going to be lasting economic impact that needed to be explained to you, our audience. The strikes were also part of a larger national labor story we had already seen playing out in LA through labor actions by hotel workers, fast food workers and many others who keep LA going.

Pathways For Emerging Talent

As a public media innovator, KCRW is proud to use our platform to amplify the next generation of talent. Supported by Members, Champions, and institutional funders, these initiatives nurture new voices and bring you fresh perspectives.

Interns: In partnership with Los Angeles County, KCRW offered paid internships to undergraduate students in the membership, audience, and music teams. We provided professional development opportunities and mentorship throughout the summer. Interns contributed their ideas and skills to influence community events, music selections, email appeals, member benefits, and newsletters.

Podcast Bootcamp: Aspiring podcasters came to KCRW to hone their storytelling skills thanks to this program, designed to increase the diversity of people contributing to the work on public media.



Young Creators Project: Los Angeles youth shared their music, journalistic storytelling, and visual arts. The top creators were featured across KCRW channels including our website, social media, and on-air.

Fellows

Our Report LA Fellowship program recruits underrepresented voices to public radio. The Fellowship pays full-time salaries and provides extensive training in public radio producing and reporting. Two cohorts have completed their fellowships and we are proud to have placed two of our Fellows in full-time positions at KCRW.

Now in its third cohort, thanks to our ongoing funders, the Report LA Fellowship continues to be an important investment in the future of KCRW and public media.

Public Radio Engineering Apprenticeship

KCRW's Public Radio Engineer Apprenticeship aims to diversify the next generation of engineers by providing a hands-on, paid, 18-month program to attract early career individuals to train for this critical role.






Miracle on 89.9th St: A KCRW Member-Only Holiday Movie Marathon

A Note From Anne Litt, Music Director



At a time when music curation is being driven by algorithms and artificial intelligence, KCRW's human-curated music programming is a precious source of real connection. This year, KCRW Music stayed strong hosting 34 live performances and 34 Guest DJ Sessions as we invited artists into our studios to share music and their inspirations. We continue to be at the forefront of music discovery and are constantly working to bring you the best up-and-coming musicians and legendary artists alike.

KCRW has continued to deliver exceptional music programming that highlights both established and up-and-coming artists. This year, we leaned into in-studio performances and interviews. We brought you 34 in-depth, personal Guest DJ sets with artists ranging from Nabihah Iqbal, St. Panther, John Stamos, Leon Michels, Seal, and the Trans Chorus of Los Angeles.

We also invited 34 artists into our studios for Live From KCRW sessions including Arlo Parks, Baby Rose, Natalia Lafourcade, WITCH, Slowdive, and many more.

National And Regional Edward R. Murrow Award For **Best Radio News Documentary**


Burned, a major investigative project from KCRW, CapRadio, and The California Newsroom focused on the devastating Caldor fire. It revealed how the U.S. Forest Service has fallen short in doing what the agency knows must be done to keep Californians safe from wildfires.

KCRW reporter Caleigh Wells was a part of the project team. Her work focused on Big Bear, where only a fraction of the thousands of forest acres approved for thinning and prescribed burns had been properly managed. This was reporting with life and death consequences, demonstrating the enormity of KCRW's service to the public.




